#### **SETTING**

### GOSPEL - Luke 22, 14 - 23, 56

"Simon, I have prayed for you, that your faith will not waver. You, therefore, when you return, strengthen your brothers. (22, 32).

"The Lord turned and looked at Peter." (Lk 22, 61)

"Father forgive them, they do not know what they are doing" (Lk 23:14)

"Today, you will be with me in Paradise." (Lk 23, 43)

"The lights of Saturday were already shining" (Lk 23, 54).

Today we are called to contemplate and deepen the Passion of Jesus of Nazareth. For practical reasons we do not present the voluminous text of that story, but yes, some of Luke's own phrases. That is right, every year on Palm Sunday we read the Passion story in one of the three Synoptic Gospels. This year we are given to contemplate the Passion in the Gospel of Luke. It is true that, in what is important, the four accounts of the Passion are very similar, but if we observe them carefully, we perceive that each of the Evangelists has its own nuances. Here then, some episodes and some Jesus announced to Peter his triple denial. This, the three gospels tell him, but Luke is the only one who speaks of what Jesus said to Peter at that time: "Simon, I have prayed for you so that your faith does not falter and that, when you return one day, you comfort your brothers" (22,32). Luke is also the only one to highlight how Jesus looked at Peter after he disowned him: (Lk 22,61). "The Lord turned and looked at Peter. In the text of Isaiah that we read this Sunday we find the explanation: "The Lord has given me the language of a man who allows himself to be instructed so that I know how to comfort those who can no longer" This is what Jesus tries to do with his disciple: to comfort, in advance, the one who will have disowned him and who runs the risk of becoming discouraged. Another episode, typical of the Gospel of Luke in the Passion of Jesus, is the appearance before Herod Antipas: "Knowing that Jesus relieved Herod of authority, Pilate sent him to him who, at that time, was in Jerusalem. From that day on, Herod and Pilate became friends, because before they were declared enemies." Luke's own three phrases in the Passion narrative: Two of them were pronounced by Jesus and, if Luke picks them up, it is because they reveal, in his eyes, what is important: « "Father, forgive them because they do not know what they are doing. That is right, they kill the Lord of Life. Yes, in the name of God, the Sanhedrin condemns God. And what does Jesus do? His only word is an expression of forgiveness! And it is precisely there, in that Christ forgiving his enemy brothers that we discover how far God's love reaches. Second sentence: "Today, you will be with me in Paradise" Everyone attacks Jesus: "If you are the Messiah..." And that is when the one we call "good thief" intervenes. He begins by saying a great truth: What happens to us is fair. After we have done

what we have done, we deserve it." Third sentence, which only Luke says: "Already the lights of du Sabbat are shining!" (23, 54). Luke ends the account of the Passion and death of Christ with an insistent evocation of the Sabbath. Luke specifies that the women who accompanied Jesus from Galilee went to see the tomb and to verify how the body of Jesus had been deposited. Having prepared the ointments and perfumes beforehand, they retired to observe the Sabbath. The story of those terrible hours ends on a note of light and peace. Isn't it curious? "Already the lights of the Sabbath shine": And how right Luke is in insisting on this fact! In the Passion and death of Jesus of Nazareth, the new humanity is born: the kingdom of grace has begun. From now on, our crucifixes show us the path to follow: the path of love towards others and, whatever the cost, the path of forgiveness.
