

GOSPEL - Mark 6:1-6

"He left there and came to his homeland, and his disciples followed him. When the Sabbath came, he began to teach in the synagogue. When the crowd heard him, they were amazed and said, "Where does this come from?" what wisdom is this that has been given to him? And those miracles done by his hands? Is not this the carpenter, the son of Mary and brother of James, Joseph, Judas and Simon? And are not his sisters here among us? ?» And they were scandalized because of him. Jesus said to them: "A prophet alone in his country, among his relatives and in his house lacks prestige." And he could not perform any miracles there, except for a few sick people whom he cured by laying his hands on them. And he marveled at their lack of faith and went around the surrounding towns teaching.

To deepen the Word of God today (Marie- Noëlle THABUT)

In the first reading, the text of **Ezekiel 2, 2-5** is nothing more than a small part of the long story of Ezekiel's vocation. When God sends on a mission, he always gives the necessary strength. For Ezekiel it was a great, unforgettable vision, whose memory will sustain all his efforts from now on. God addresses Ezekiel, here, far from the motherland and the Temple: it is the first Good News of this book: God has no fixed residence in Jerusalem. God is equally present in Babylon. Ezequiel sees the open heavens and there he is immersed in a universe of indescribable beauty.

The prayer of our **Psalm 122 (123)** was born in a climate of suspicion. The survivors returned to the country full of enthusiasm: as soon as they arrived, even before they could build the Temple, they established worship in circumstantial facilities. Who else but God could make their rights recognized? We can then understand why the psalm implores three times "Mercy", but without forgetting that "the hand of the LORD is not short when it comes to saving"?

It is in no way a question for Paul to become proud, since his listeners were in charge of returning him to humility without stopping. "No one is a prophet in his own land," goes the saying known and lived in Israel long before the coming of Jesus Christ. But Paul apparently had another, even better reason for being humble: if what the text says is to be believed, Paul carried, within himself, a permanent reminder of his littleness. In his letter, **2 Corinthians 12, 7-10,** Paul tells us: "Three times I have asked the Lord to take that away from me," and the Lord had answered her simply: "My grace is sufficient for you: my power spreads to every extent in the weakness".

Hoy, Marc 6, 1 - 6 states: "A prophet is only despised in his country, in his own family and in his own home." You listen to him but the people remain like marble. And this indifference of the participants closes the way to miracles: in the preceding chapters, Mark points out several times that miracle and faith occur at the same time, be it in the calm storm (4, 35 - 41), as in the liberation of the possessed man from Gerasa (5, 1 - 20), or in the healing of Jairus' daughter and the hemorrhagic woman (5, 20 - 43). Here, Mark reiterates what has already been proposed: where there is no faith, there can be no miracle. It is clear that Jesus did not expect this scandalized reaction, since Mark states: "Jesus is surprised by his lack of faith." But for Jesus this episode, so inglorious, experienced in Nazareth, makes him sense the cross in the future, this is the fate of the prophets of all times, faced with a structural disbelief. However, the episode ends with a small glow of optimism: even in Nazareth, in a hostile climate, Jesus has been able, despite everything, to perform some cures. Which clearly means that, despite all our ill will, we must never lose hope!

- How does Jesus act to overcome the lack of faith of his relatives?
- What does this text say to your life?
- What does it tell us as a community, parish...?
