GOSPEL – Luke 14, 25-33

"Many people were walking with him, and turning to them he said, 'If anyone comes to me and does not hate his father, his mother, his wife, his children, his brothers, his sisters, and even his own life, He cannot be my disciple. Whoever does not bear his cross and come after me cannot be my disciple. "For which of you, who wants to build a tower, does not first sit down and calculate the cost, and see if he has to finish it? Lest, having laid the foundation and not being able to finish, all who see it begin to mock him, saying, "This man began to build and was not able to finish." Or what king, who goes out to confront another king, does he not first sit down and deliberate whether he can meet the one who comes against him with twenty thousand with ten thousand men? And if not, while he is still a long way off, he sends an embassy to ask for terms of peace. In the same way, any of you who do not renounce all his possessions cannot be my disciple."

We deepen the Gospel

Let us start with the phrase of Jesus that concerns our affective family relationships; Jesus does not tell us to abandon them as this would be unfairly useless and uselessly cruel to those around us. It would also be contrary to all his teaching on love and also to the commandments "you shall honour your father and your mother". This entire means, without a doubt: these emotional ties are good, but they should not be obstacles. A bond of union that prevented us from following Jesus Christ would not be a sign of true love. From now on, the bond that unites us to Jesus in Baptism is stronger than any earthly bond.

But the difficulty of this gospel lies elsewhere, because, at first glance, the relationship between the different parts that make it up is not very clear: first sentence of Jesus: "If someone comes to me, without preferring me to his father and his mother..., he cannot be my disciple..." This will be taken up as an echo (in inclusion) in the last sentence: "Whoever among you does not renounce all his goods, cannot be my disciple." Between these two sentences, we find two small parables: the one about the man who wants to build a tower and the one about the king who is going to wage war. The lessons they offer are similar: when you want to build a tower, you have to start by doing your math; otherwise you can embark on madness. As for the king planning a war, he too must first take stock of his possibilities: wisdom consists in adjusting his ambitions to the level of his means.

Jesus, in his speech, says the same thing: "Accept not having security: my grace is sufficient for you." The first reading of the book of Wisdom tells us clearly: the wisdom of God is not the wisdom of men. Indeed: what would seem madness in the eyes of men is the wisdom that God loves. With him we are always in the logic of the grain of wheat that agrees to be buried, but that is the price that it can germinate and bear fruit.

Blessed are those who know how to get rid of false precautions... Perhaps that is what prepares them to go through the narrow door that we talked about two Sundays ago (Luke 13, 24)
