GOSPEL – Mathew 1, 18 – 24

"The generation of Jesus Christ was like this: His mother, Mary, was betrothed to Joseph and, before they began to be together, she was found to be with child from the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a righteous man and unwilling to expose her to public disgrace, planned to dismiss her quietly. But just when he had resolved to do this, the Angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said: "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary with you as your wife, for what the child conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son, and you will name him Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins." All this took place to fulfil what had been spoken by the lord through the prophet; "Look the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they will name him Emmanuel, which means: "God with us." When Joseph awoke from sleep, he did as the angel of the Lord had commanded him; he took her as his wife.

We deepen the Gospel

Saint Matthew begins his gospel with the phrase: "Book of the generation of Jesus Christ."

When it comes to Joseph, the logical relationship follows: "Jacob begot Joseph" but, from there, the evangelist cannot use the same formula, he cannot say: "Joseph begot Jesus" and says: "Jacob begot Joseph, husband of Mary, of whom was born Jesus, who is called Christ."

This verse clearly shows the break in the genealogy: according to the usual formula "Joseph begot Jesus." Thus, he would automatically be from the lineage of David, but here, for Jesus to be inscribed in this line, it is necessary for Joseph to adopt him. From here, the Son of God is delivered into the hands of the humanity; God's project depends on the human being accepting it through the good will of a man: Joseph.

This free acceptance of a just man conditions the beginning of the human history of Jesus. Mathew insists: when the Angel addresses Joseph, he calls him "son of David". The words that follow clearly show the mystery of the filiation of Jesus: begotten by the Holy Spirit and not by Joseph, he will nevertheless be recognized as his son: "Do not be afraid to receive Mary, your wife, into your house", what he wants say that Jesus will be introduced into his house and, furthermore, Joseph will be the one who gives Jesus his name. Regarding the name of Jesus, Mathew explains what this name means: "Jesus means the Lord saves" and goes on explaining: "because it is he who will save the world from its sins." This precision is interesting because it shows that the Jewish people were waiting impatiently for the Messiah, and not just a political Messiah who would free them from Roman occupation.

The second precision about the name of Jesus, said by the angel to Joseph: "You will call your son Jesus, which means "the Lord saves", because he is the one who will save his people from their sins." And Matthew comments: "All this happened so that the word of the Lord would be fulfilled...he will be given the name Emmanuel which means: "God with us". Being saved from our sins is simply knowing that God is with us, never doubting that he is by our side and, as the prophet Micah said, "Living in his presence." That is exactly what Joseph did!

Imaginative contemplation

After reading the text calmly, remember what is said in it, imagine the scene,

Ruminate those words that seem most significant to you.

- Look at the attitude of Maria, of Joseph; what are they inviting you to? What do they convey in their gestures?

- Live a time of gratitude, of gratitude. Perform a conversion gesture.
